
Plant-O-Rama, continued: Our booth was small, but it was packed with great, colorful bromeliads grown by our members.



Nature's Helpers: Last fall we had a slide presentation on animals that live in bromeliads. If you live near a water source, you may be fortunate to have California native tree frogs living in your bromeliads. The one at right is perched on my *Quesnelia* 'Rafael Oliveira' on a shelf in front of my kitchen window where it can take advantage of the insects attracted by the light. I have a number of large bromeliads in my collection such as *Aechmea blanchetiana* or *Tillandsia australis*. Virtually every one of them has a resident tree frog, that is just waiting for a mosquito to fly in.


I thought that I had heard a frog orgy one night down the hill in my shade house. On June 8, the proof of the frog romance was visible in the large tank of my Neoregelia johannis. There was a cluster of well-developed eggs that were almost ready to hatch, and the usually clear water was clouded with algae. Perhaps the frogs defecate in the water to aide in algae growth as a food supply. Two days later (photo below right), the pollywogs had hatched and as of today, July 23, they are beginning to grow their legs. I have been adding extra water and fish food because they had consumed all of the algae. The frogs usually reproduce in the creek behind my house and this is only the second time that I have seen pollywogs in my bromeliads. It is a real treat to hear their little.

bromeliads. It is a real treat to hear their little voices all over my yard at sunset in the spring and I am thankful that they love to eat mosquitoes.
